Speaking of prayer, it has been wonderful to get together to pray with others from the Church (via computers) on Saturday mornings. Reasons to be grateful. At a recent on line service, they sang a poignant favourite of our church, 10000 Reasons <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=XtwlT8JjddM>. I found myself singing at the top of my voice with Matt Redman... "Bless the Lord oh my soul, Oh my soul .Worship His Holy name. Sing like never before, Oh my soul. I'll worship Your Holy name. The sun comes up, It's a new day dawning, It's time to sing Your song again. Whatever may pass and whatever lies before me; Let me be singing When the evening comes..." I found it uplifting as well as reflective. Give it a try... This week I have been communicating with the parents, grandparents and young people of our Church Family on a theme of reasons to be grateful. Rebecca, Sarah, Ella and Will have been keeping a chat group going for the YAGs. Rebecca and Sarah, who are both working mothers with toddlers, are enjoying quality time with their husbands and youngsters at home, with no pressure to travel. Time at home has been a joy. Sarah, whose new baby is due imminently, says "in this challenging time it is so easy to think of all the things we are missing, our family, our friends, holidays, school, clubs etc. However, in Numbers 6:22-27, the Lord teaches Moses how to bless people. I have spent some quiet time thinking of just how many blessings I have, even in this tricky time. An amazing NHS service, with Midwives and Doctors happy to help in any and every way they can; technology which allows me to stay in touch with so many friends and family; food and other delivery services which selflessly protect me from putting myself at risk; lovely neighbours and a special community feeling in the village, where people will go above and beyond to help others; but most importantly, the time with my gorgeous daughter and loving husband a family together and being able to make special memories, particularly as Chloe grows up so quickly. Perhaps we should take this time to stop and think, before we moan about all of the things we can't do, what an amazing world we do live in and how there are so

many things that God has blessed us with."

Rebecca has found that she now has some time to attend services at different virtual churches across the wider church. Both Rebecca and Fenella, who are in the Alpha group, have discovered that during lockdown, they can attend "HTB at home" each Sunday. Fenella says "Those who came to our Alpha course will recognise the vicar of Holy Trinity, Brompton, Nicky Gumble, as he leads the service from his home with wife Pippa. There are intercessory prayers, sermons, interviews, worship songs and a time to let God touch us through his Holy Spirit. I think we have all found the joy in the online services from across the diocese and now with our own website (<http://olney.church>) and online services (<http://olney.church/zoom>) now firmly established we are well served... Our church administrator Katie has been enjoying home schooling, as it allows her to re-live her previous career as a teacher, although her seven year old is not yet appreciative of A-level Chemistry and Maths! She is also due a baby soon and whilst social distancing rules will make it difficult for family to meet the impending arrival, she is grateful for the technology that allows them to keep in touch and the caring NHS. Caroline has been grateful for the unexpected opportunity to spend time with her sons, two of whom were away at university. Caroline says "Having my family safely together for an extended period is a wonderful blessing. It is rare nowadays to all be together and especially for a long time. We are very lucky to enjoy this time and be well right now and are praying for those who are unable to be with family and those facing ill health. We are extremely lucky to have a lovely garden which I spend much time in. Seeing the garden bursting into life this spring, during a spell of sunshine, has been most uplifting. This is particularly poignant when many can't get outside or enjoy open spaces. The boys are grateful to be able to enjoy exercising out on their bikes; for relaxation and for the technology to communicate with others and stay in touch. Richard and Nicole have one of their children back home too. Nicole writes "We are thankful that although our families are mostly living far away from us, with Daniel in Leeds and Alex in Ireland, we have been blessed to have Corrie at home, making a good recovery from glandular fever. We are thankful that we can meet with the whole family via Zoom, and although we should have had time with our granddaughter in person, we have been able to see her progress online, watching her crawl, get her first teeth and see her try and kiss us on the screen!" As a grandmother myself, I too appreciate the joy of online communication, discussing course work with my middle granddaughter, watching my youngest granddaughter's antics and the elation of hearing my 11 year old grandson Finley (who is very challenged by autism) reading for the very first time on Facebook Messenger.
