Rector's letter

We have celebrated Easter, The Ascension, Pentecost and this week The Trinity; Jesus died in our place to forgive and redeem us, He beat death and sin by the cross and His Resurrection, He is now back in the heavenly presence of the Father and the Holy Spirit, and so this week we celebrate the unity and diversity of our God who is One and is also Three.

When I had a season working with Muslim men we used to have some very interesting conversations about who God is and that He is One but also Three:

"How can God be One and God be Three?"

"Well how can a man be one and three?"

"He cannot!"

"But what if you go home and greet your father, and then your uncle comes in and greets his brother, and then later on your grandfather arrives and greets his son. There is only one man but he is father, brother and son." Your father can be one and also be three!"

In the Bible we see God as the Trinity at the baptism of Jesus:

"And when Jesus had been baptized, just as He came up from the water, suddenly the heavens were opened to Him and He saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and alighting on him. And a voice from heaven said, 'This is my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased.'" (Matthew 3:16,17).

God (beyond our understanding) truly is our Father, Big Brother and Helper!

Amazing Grace and John Newton

Dear All. This week our wonderful, internationally acclaimed, local hymn has been the centre of attention. Firstly Judy Collins, who recorded "Amazing Grace" on an album 50 years ago, has re-released it, backed by a choir of singers across the globe. In conjunction with this David was interviewed on 3 Counties radio in relation to this new release by Judy. Our own Kate Nicholas listened in and complimented David for his recall of dates and facts and was pleased he raised the very topical point about what it teaches about racial equality against the background of the current unrest in the US. Our local best-selling Christian author Kate also tells us that she is working on a new book project as part of the AMG250 celebrations. She says that 'Amazing Grace: Following in the footsteps of John Newton' is about the places that shaped Newton's life and ministry – including Olney – and the people he continues to inspire today (think Bill Bryson + God).

But for me there is another truly "Amazing" recording. This time by 50 Covid affected countries who sing Amazing Grace in their own languages. The video, images and the song in multiple languages is spine-chillingly beautiful and the whole thing so moving. Please watch at

"Amazing Grace" is one of the most recognisable songs in the English-speaking world and from our own website we learn that... *"The names of Olney and of John Newton have been connected since the former slave-trader was curate at St Peter and St Paul church between 1764 and 1780. Newton's friendship enabled William Wilberforce to become the greatest advocate of the abolition of the slave trade. Later, they worked together to establish a home for freed slaves in Sierra Leone {where we still have links today} - this is how the villages of Newton and Wilberforce came to being. Newton wrote the words from personal experience. He grew up without any particular religious conviction but his life's path was formed by a variety of twists and coincidences that were often put into motion by his recalcitrant insubordination. He was pressed into the Royal Navy and became a sailor, eventually participating in the slave trade. One night a terrible storm battered his vessel so severely that he became frightened enough to call out to God for mercy, a moment that marked the beginning of his spiritual conversion. His career in slave trading lasted a few years more until he quit going to sea altogether and began studying theology. Ordained in the Church of England in 1764, Newton became curate of Olney, where he began to write hymns with poet William Cowper. "Amazing Grace" was written to illustrate a sermon on New Year's Day of 1773, with a message that forgiveness and redemption are possible regardless of the sins people commit and that the soul can be delivered from despair through the mercy of God."*

This brings me neatly on to the fact that we will be celebrating 250 years since that New Year's Day sermon, and the first singing of Amazing Grace, with our own celebrations in 2023. Under the banner AMG250 Amazing Grace 250 the countdown has already begun with events being planned. There is already a search on for "Amazing Graces" to get in touch. Do you know an "Amazing Grace"? In line with this we are planning our own events at church and a dedicated area to display and celebrate the life and work of John Newton. Last year we were promised the gift of a triptych by the artist Mike Haywood (picture attached). The triptych shows scenes relating to John Newton. It has a central panel 64" by 48" and two side panels each of 32" by 48". The artwork is quite dramatic. The Fabric Committee has discussed the siting of the triptych and has concluded that it will fit perfectly on the back wall of the outer vestry. The plan would be to remove one or perhaps two pews and open up a reflective, quiet area themed around John Newton. This area could then accommodate more display materials, which would be especially appropriate, as we expect there to be an increase in the number of visitors in the run up to AMG250. Further discussion has led to us looking at moving the "John Newton" pulpit into the Welcome Area near the main door. This will give us more scope when we come to reordering the whole of the area at the back of the church. More news on this soon. *Susan Bailey, Churchwarden*
