Rector's letter

Dear Family, I have just written a piece for the Phonebox that I would like to share with you all. It means that you all get things hot from the press and before the rest of the Phonebox circulation: **A new start.** Many of us are wondering about the future and what it will look like and what it will bring for us. Of course there is so much that we do not know, so much has changed and so much will change; and change can be so very messy. A clergyman recently told me that he and his Church were making sure that they do not rush into the next season whatever that is for them. They have adopted the slogan 'Selah' which is Hebrew for pause. The mnemonic that they are using is: 'Stop Everything Listen And Hear'

They are pausing, praying and planning using 'Selah' because they want to come up with God's ideas, God's solutions and God's plans for the new season that they will be entering after 'lockdown' is over. For some of us, our lives will go back to things pretty much as they were before the pandemic, while others will start new ventures in a totally new way. Here are some thought provoking quotes that relate to starting new things in life:

"New beginnings are often disguised as painful endings." - Lao Tzu (Taoism)

For many we have been or are in a place of pain; there are new things ahead for us. "It is never too late to be what you might have been." -- George Eliot. This may be a time for us to step out of any regrets that we have from the past and walk into being more of the person that we have always longed to be. "If you can't fly, then run, if you can't run, then walk, if you can't walk, then crawl, but by all means keep moving." -- Martin Luther King Jr. If we have good dreams (and Martin Luther King Jr certainly did) then they are worth pursuing and it is good to not be side-tracked, good not to give in to disillusionment and good to keep working at them. With the Christian faith there is much to be said of new starts. The Bible tells us that if anyone becomes a Christian, "... they are a new creation; old things have passed away; behold, all things have become new." We are also told that whenever we make mistakes and ask for forgiveness God will completely forgive us: "The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, His mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is (His) faithfulness". Dear All. Over the next few weeks we will be sharing what has happened over lockdown in relation to our lives, our church family and our church building. Then when you return to church we hope you will feel well informed and ready as Andrew our rector says, to adopt a new start and new beginnings. This week Andrew writes about his time in lockdown entitled: **Sorry I cannot meet with you to tell you this in person!** *During this very odd time in our lives I have had to adapt to a lot of new things. One of them is spending time with people via computer instead of meeting with them face to face. I have really missed talking with folk and worshipping in person with you all. It has also been strange to write sermons, and of course our newly instituted 'Thoughts for the Day', and to then not be able to deliver them to you in the normal way. But all that said I have found it really rewarding to write these meditations and more. In addition to my own writings I have so valued and appreciated the sermons and thoughts written by the Ministry Team and especially Janet, Thelma and Jo. If you haven't been following these, please 'give them a go'; they are full of wonderful insights and gems. So in lockdown, how have I coped / survived? Well, I have been saying the daily office at home as usual, but like you I've been unable to go into the Church or meet up with others and celebrate Holy Communion or take part in other services. (That has been frustrating). On the other hand it has been encouraging for me to 'zoom-pray' with many of you on Saturday mornings and for a group of us to say 'zoom daily prayer' together on Wednesday mornings. It is my privilege to pray for everyone: Church people, town people, children and schoolteachers, 'rugby clubbers' and so many more. Part of my new prayer schedule is that I walk and pray around the town. During these last months I have normally set off with a sun hat and shepherd's crook between 2pm and 3pm. As well as praying, I have had some good conversations with the people who I have met on the way. This strange period has also allowed me time to reflect on my first 18 months in post in the parish and to seek God for our next season together. I am truly grateful for the Standing Committee who has met every week since the announcement of lockdown, the PCC for their wisdom and support, the Ministry Team who lead and preach so well and the individuals and groups who enrich our corporate life and mission as a Church. Thank you everyone! Outside of the parish I have had other duties to perform, (as best as I can within the government regulations). I am just beginning to meet with Police workers in person again, but until recently everything had to be done by video conference calls or by phone. I do not as yet visit all of the officers and staff in Milton Keynes Police Station (as I used to) but I am there on Wednesday afternoons working in an allocated office and individuals are able to come and meet with me at a 'social distance' if they so wish. Andrew Geary is the Mayor of Milton Keynes this year and he is doing a splendid job for us all. I have the honour to be his chaplain; so this year he, Lisa and their family are particularly remembered and prayed for. As part of my 'out of parish' duties I have been invited to attend some very small gatherings which have included*

commemorating VE day in Bletchley and remembering Albert French, (the boy soldier) at the Rose in Milton Keynes. Personally, Fenella and I have been 're-enjoying' taking the 'Marriage Course'. We have chosen to do that to refresh our memories of how helpful it is and with a view to offering it to others when we are all allowed to meet together again. Like many others we have also been stepping up to the challenge of home schooling and caring for our little tribe who have been unable to see and play with their friends. The children have been enjoying the garden during this time whilst I have been doing my best not to kill off every plant and vegetable that we have. Thankfully, this week we have help in the garden again; I can now go from 'worrying the flowers' and 'flourishing the weeds' to just 'watering the flowers' and 'frightening the weeds' (by letting someone who can tell the difference sort things out). My prayer is that during this difficult time and into the future God the gardener will continue to care for us His garden and that He will grow us and care for us all: "So neither the one who plants nor the one who waters is anything, but only God who gives the growth". 1 Corinthians 3 verse 7. Every blessing, stay safe in God's love, Andrew+
