Rector's letter

Dear Family. This Sunday we can come together to once more meet in our Church building. My thanks go especially to David our Senior Churchwarden for all of his hard work and wisdom in leading us through the very complex and ever-changing guidelines and advice from the government and the Church of England. David has worked so hard on our behalf to get us to the point where worshipping God in the building is now possible. From this Sunday onwards we plan to have a Holy Communion or 'Everyone Together' service at 10am in Church each Sunday, Morning Prayer by zoom Wednesday morning at 9.30am, private prayer in the Church on Wednesday (noon till 3pm) and we will continue our prayer time every Saturday at 10.30am by zoom. For those who are not able or ready to join with us on Sunday in the Church there is still the Diocese Holy Communion online at 10am and various other services that are still being offered online.

It is really important that no one feels that one kind of Communion service is better than or inferior to any other. The term 'Spiritual Communion' has been used historically to describe the means of grace by which a person, prevented for some serious reason from sharing in a celebration of the Eucharist, nonetheless shares in the communion of Jesus Christ. Over the years I have celebrated 'Spiritual Communion' where people live, in care homes and in hospitals. It is what Jesus has done for us and not what we can do for Him that makes the difference in our lives. To not be able to physically receive the bread or the wine does not preclude anyone from remembering all that Jesus has done for them on the cross and receiving the benefits of Jesus' passion for them. The Church of England form of prayer below (after the Prayer of St Richard of Chichester) offers Christians an opportunity to give thanks for their communion with Jesus, particularly at times when they would ordinarily be present at the Eucharist. The Book of Common Prayer instructs us that if we offer ourselves in penitence and faith, giving thanks for the redemption won by Christ crucified, we may truly 'eat and drink the Body and Blood of our Saviour Jesus Christ', although we cannot receive the sacrament physically in ourselves. 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Dear All. This week we catch up on what has been happening behind the scenes at church and with some of our Church Family as they start to socialise and get out and about with some sort of normality after many long weeks in lockdown. On 17th March, the Standing Committee first met by conference call (using Zoom) and have continued every week since then. The members are Andrew P-K, David P, Susan B, Lisa G, Pat P, Haydn L (co-oped). PCC meetings are suspended, but minutes are circulated to PCC from Standing Committee and all members have been voting on key issues. The last physical PCC was on 18th February when we discussed *Deanery of Newport – A Future Fit for Purpose*. Now, to add to that mix, we are looking at the *New Normal*. We are analysing and collating your views at present and will feed back in Autumn. We will also be focussing on our Mission and objectives for 2021 and beyond. Also, as published in 7th June, we are working on our John Newton area for AMFG250 celebrations in 2022/23, which will see Amazing Grace celebrated in many different ways. Its appearance during many Oxford and other Services, plus YouTube and special releases over lockdown has been very special and uplifting. As I write this it, is just being sung at this week's Oxford service. David Phillipson is our representative on the AMG250.

In fact, behind the scenes David has been very busy indeed. In the day David has a full time and very demanding job, but somehow he manages to fit in numerous church jobs, most of which are complex and involve a mountain of paperwork and legislation. For instance, last week David read 80 pages of Diocesan directions to compile a 38-point plan that covered all the areas we need comply with to enable us to reopen. Every Tuesday he chairs the Standing Committee on Zoom. He has also set up the Wednesday and Saturday Zoom groups. For many months he has been working with various bodies to plan, price and comply with the requirements needed for our new security and alarm system both in church and on the roof. These plans, including a new security door leading up to the Cowley Room, are coming to fruition. David has also used his drawing skills to produce a drawing for a faculty to remove some pews from the area which will become the John Newton area at the back of the inner vestry. This area, if all goes to plan, will contain the new Triptych, the churchwardens' chest and perhaps the old font. There will be seating for small groups and it will display items on John Newton, as well as containing thoughtful and mindful literature to support quiet contemplation and prayer. This will then allow us to look afresh at the re-ordering of the Welcome area within the space available. In addition, David and Susan B have worked with the nursery to draw up a new contract, rates and hours of opening, which David has now finalised. Finally, David together with Tim H (who has been regularly inspecting our building during lockdown), using Diocese guidance, prepared our church for its opening for private prayer (now Weds 12-2 and Sunday 11-12) and our opening on 26th July 10am. We intend to take the utmost care with you, our Church Family.

1. There will be a communion in one kind (i.e bread/wafer only) on 26th July at 10 am.
2. Maximum attendance of 47 people/families/bubbles
3. There will be NO 8.30am service during August
4. The 10am services on Sunday 9th and 30th August will be 'Everyone together' family services
5. There will be no midweek services of Holy Communion on the Wednesday mornings before September.
6. There will be no resumption of evening prayers in any format before September
7. Online prayers by 'Zoom' will continue on Wednesdays at 9.30 and Saturdays at 10.30
8. Private Prayer will continue throughout August. Weds 12-2 and Sun 11-12 only.

Track and Trace Scam. On the subject of Track and Trace: This is a UK wide system, which alerts you to the fact you have been in contact with a Covid19 sufferer. Then this week Rita came to church with her new grandson Albert and she had been uplifted to be able to take him out and enjoy his company in the sunshine.
